SYMPTOMS OF UTERINE CANCER

As many of you know, I had a radical hysterectomy just before Thanksgiving for uterine cancer. Talking about it, I came to realize that it wasn't only me who didn't know the symptoms for this disease. The symptoms are varied and not big. I had brown blood on the toilet paper once and then nothing for 2 months. It was easy to put off seeing the doctor because it couldn't be anything significant. But it was. And not only that, I was in the 5% of the cases with aggressive cancer. So far I have a good prognosis, but do have to go through chemo. So when your doctor asks if you had any unusual vaginal discharge, ask what you are looking for. It can be red blood, brown blood, an irritating clear or yellowish greenish discharge, just once and then nothing for several months or for several days. The thing you need to know is that any time after menopause none of these are "normal," and you need to have it checked. It is not always cancer, but the risk for not checking it out is too great to ignore these symptoms. Please talk about this at your other meetings this month and in the future whether with AAUW, church, family and any group of women. Awareness will save someone's life. Thanks.
