## FROM THE PODIUM

Betty Hooker, Sue Zitnick and I traveled to Seven Springs Mountain Resort in Somerset County for the AAUW-PA Annual Meeting, April 13-15. There were 111 attendees from 23 Branches. It was a busy weekend. Friday evening, Kimberly Churches, CEO, AAUW spoke on *Changing the Conversation and Moving Forward*. Saturday began with the concurrent sessions including *Small Branches: Big Ideas*, *Tears We Cannot Stop*, and *Hate Crimes and Hate Prevention*. The Hon. Marjorie J. Fox, DA for Greene County, spoke on *Women in Local Politics* at the Opening Plenary. Later at lunch, California University of PA Campus Action Project students spoke on *Closing the Gender Wage Gap*. Afternoon concurrent sessions included *STEM Programs, Step by Step*, *Build Global Citizens: Great Decisions Program Fosters Local Discussions*, and *Reaching Out: Student Loan Solutions for College Students*. Other afternoon activities included the AAUW-PA Student Advisory Council on Intersectional Feminism as well as a National AAUW Topics Discussion.

**Saturday evening awards for the York Branch included being recognized as #1 in total giving (\$11,852) and #1 in per capita giving (\$118.52). Barbara Gold was recognized as an AAUW-PA Special Honoree and Lois Conaway was recognized as an AAUW-PA Branch Outstanding Woman.** The after-dinner speaker was Susan Frietsche from the Women's Law Project. Sunday's activities included the Closing Plenary on *Gerrymandering: Taking Away our Voice*, installation of officers, District Meetings, and ended with a Counterparts session. It was a weekend well spent as well as energizing for all participants.

**Our slate of officers is still lacking: we need a Co-President** to work with Carol Heintzelman. It is a 2-year position and not too difficult. Many of you have served in the past as president, as I have, as well as Carol, who was president in Lancaster before joining the York Branch. Most of the work is done by others – Program, Membership, Finance, Secretary, etc. Running the meetings as well as the Board meetings is the bulk of the responsibility. ## AAUW VOTING ON BYLAWS

From AAUW:

“The AAUW National Board of Directors has voted to put three proposals for bylaws amendments before the membership for a vote this spring. The board strongly supports the proposed amendments that we believe will help keep AAUW vital as an organization and enable us to increase our impact in advancing equity for women and girls.

The proposed amendments address creating three-year staggered board terms, opening board service to those outside of the AAUW membership, and eliminating the degree requirement for membership. While rationale and details for each proposed amendment can be found on the [AAUW website](#), the overarching motivation for these changes at this time is to uphold and advance AAUW’s mission and ensure optimal execution at the national board level.

Voting will open on April 25, 2018, and close June 9, 2018, at 9 p.m. ET. We encourage you all to engage in respectful debate that has always been a hallmark of the AAUW community, exercise your vote, and encourage fellow members to do the same.”

Jazmin, a graduate of Dallastown High School and Penn State University, is pursuing a Master's Degree in Public Policy and Administration through Northwestern University's distance learning program. Below we reprint portions of Jazmin's essay to the application question of how she plans to work to empower women so that you may get the fullest idea of why she has been chosen.

I have had the wonderful opportunity over the years to witness many positive changes in society from the DREAM Act to marriage equality that improve and insure human rights in our society. However, I have also witnessed the avoidance of change from our predominately male run state and federal governments regarding gender inequalities. Therefore, it is clear work still needs to be done.

Studying public policy is providing me with the skills, knowledge, and tools I need to advocate for women's issues and rights. It allows me and my fellow classmates to effectively communicate the importance of women's issues including equity pay, reproductive choice, equal and quality education, and paid maternal leave. Policy gives us the opportunity to make a difference by allowing women to continue to fight for the respect and rights we deserve as incredibly strong, invaluable members of society.

Women have consistently been underrepresented in the governmental system as policy makers. Therefore, for decades, policies that impact women and girls have been decided mainly by men. It is time for a change.

Human rights of minority groups have always been a passion of mine, and the well-being of women, children, and the LGBTQ+ community is something I take seriously. I plan to get involved in education policy to ensure that women and girls are getting the education they need as well as the career guidance they need to be successful no matter what they chose to do in life. Women are the future, and with my education, I will continue to work to empower women and girls and make sure that they have the opportunity to flourish in our society.
