FROM THE PODIUM

Over the summer I read *The Glass Universe: How the Ladies of the Harvard Observatory Took the Measure of the Stars* by Dava Sobel. It is “the captivating but little known true story of women’s landmark contributions to astronomy.” The Harvard College Observatory operated from 1839 to 1973. As I was reading, I wondered if AAUW had played a role in the education of the women since it was founded in 1874 in Boston. Yes, it did. In 1923, Cecilia Payne, who was among the first women to receive a Ph.D. in astronomy and the first from Harvard, received the Rose Sidgwick Memorial Fellowship, along with \$1,000.00, to complete her second year at Harvard (p. 209). In 1932, Annie Cannon noted in a letter regarding the Ellen Richards Research Prize, that “she had known the prize’s namesake and recalled several conversations with Mrs. Richards - at the College Club of Boston and at meetings of the Association of Collegiate Alumnae” (p. 235). The women were paid one-half the salaries of the men and did not complain because they were grateful to be employed at all in their chosen field. Although times have changed, women still earn about 80 cents for every dollar that a man earns. We need to continue working till women’s incomes have achieved 100% parity with men.

UPDATE FROM SARAH FULLER, 2017 GRADUATE SCHOLARSHIP WINNER

With continued gratitude to the York Branch of AAUW, I am happy to share with you where my academic path has led most recently. After being awarded the 2017 graduate scholarship, I began classes at Teachers College, Columbia University in the department of International and Transcultural Studies. As I worked toward my Master's in International Educational Development, I chose a concentration in International Policy and Planning with the goal of ensuring that children's right to quality education is upheld for all.

Columbia's program has been both challenging and rewarding and has provided opportunities of which I could have only dreamt a year ago. I have learned about gathering and using data to make informed policy decisions in education, focusing on intercultural education, immigration, and the inclusion of historically marginalized populations—namely girls, minorities, and those with special needs. I served as a teaching assistant for a course on research methodologies, while also writing an article on the "imagined space" of globalization and the taken-for-granted in the internationalization of higher education, which will be published by a study abroad institute this autumn. This summer, I interned with UNESCO at the Regional Bureau for Science and Culture in Europe in Venice, Italy, where I contributed to the writing of a Situation Analysis on Education in Albania as the country aims to join the European Union. I also carried out two research studies for UNESCO which will be published this fall, one of which focuses on the intersection of gender equality and education. This opened my eyes to issues that many never consider in relation to gender equality and education, including human trafficking, maternity leave policies, pedagogy that promotes girls' participations in STEM, gender-based violence, and the presence of single-sex sanitation facilities in schools.

I am currently spending my fall semester conducting research throughout Italy on teachers' attitudes toward and experiences with intercultural education, which I recently presented at the European Conference on Educational Research. Additionally, my Fiancé, Damiano, and I have begun planning our wedding and will be married here in Italy next September. In the meantime, I will return to the U.S. in December to submit my thesis and to begin my career in this field about which I have become even more passionate. I keep in my heart the gratitude I have for all who have supported me along my journey, including the AAUW York chapter.
