2019 AWARDS

A committee of past award winners choose candidates for the Member Making a Difference and Outstanding Woman awards. Additionally, the committee nominated Carol Heintzelman as an AAUW-PA Special Honoree, a prestigious State award.

2019 OUTSTANDING WOMAN AWARD

The York Branch has selected Carol Anderson as its 2019 Outstanding Woman. Carol served as Public Policy Chair from 2007 until 2016, Branch Co-Secretary from 2011-2013, as the Graduate Scholarship Chair from 2016-2018, and is presently the Finance Officer. She helped establish a co-mentoring project with Penn State-York, create a Branch Directory, and recently revised Branch financial reports to increase members' understanding.

2019 MEMBER MAKING A DIFFERENCE AWARD

The York Branch has selected Marion Bowman as its 2019 Member Making a Difference. Marion is someone the Branch can count on to help when and where she is needed. In 2017, the Branch need a Co-President and she agreed to serve a one-year term. She helped organize a dessert for newer members in October and served on the 2019 Nominating Committee. Furthermore, Marion has been working tirelessly to find chefs for the 2019 Spring Market Fare.

AAUW-PA SPECIAL HONOREE

The York Branch is pleased to nominate Carol Heintzelman as a 2019 AAUW-PA Special Honoree.

Carol joined AAUW 49 years ago when she was living and working for the Department of Public Welfare in Winchester, VA. She moved to Martinsburg, WVA in 1971, continuing her AAUW membership while she was a professor at Shepherd College.

Carol relocated to Lancaster County in 1976 to take a position at Millersville State College, which later became Millersville University. She immediately joined the Lancaster Branch. During this time, Carol was active at the State and National levels. She served from 1984-1988 as the College and University Relations Chair at the State level and then went on to serve at the National level as a member of the College and University Relations Board, a subcommittee of AAUW's national Membership Committee (1988-1992). Carol returned to the State Board in the 1990s as the Central Division Chair.

Carol led the Lancaster Branch as President in the 1980s and was a mentor and leader until the Branch disbanded in 2010. She returned to the State Board in 2011 and served as Central District Coordinator until 2014.

Carol joined the York Branch in 2012. She was the Public Policy Chair from 2014-2016 and in 2016 became Branch Co-President. Carol is now in her third year as President. Some people feel that it is time to take a break after 49 years of service, but not Carol. As her term as President ends, she has agreed to remain on the Board as Public Policy Chair. Carol's enthusiasm and long years of service to AAUW are an inspiration to us all.
