SAD NEWS - BARBARA GOLD

We are sorry to announce the passing of Barbara Gold on February 2, 2019, after a courageous battle with cancer. Barbara joined York Branch in 1974 and was a branch leader from the beginning. She served as President (1989-1991) and as Treasurer (1980-1984). She also chaired numerous fundraising projects.

Barbara's proudest achievement was encouraging the Branch to establish the York (PA) Branch American Fellowship in 1993. Throughout the 1990's, Barbara inspired York Branch to raise \$100,000 to establish an endowment; Endowment #0737 was fully funded in 2002.

Recently, Barbara focused her prodigious energy on public policy issues. She organized county-wide *Get Out the Vote* drives and served as Education Chair, urging us to call our legislators on educational issues. Barbara also had a feminine side. She loved tea parties, entertaining, fashion and decorating; she was a sales rep for Peacock Jewelry and other fashion lines for many years.

According to Sue Zitnick, "Barbara was always the one with the best ideas and the push to make all of us active. It will take many of us to try to replace her. She fought this last round of cancer never giving up until she had no strength left to fight. What a loss."

UNDERGRADUATE SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENT 2019

Selecting one young woman to receive our award of \$1500 is always a challenge. Six very strong applications were received this year, and Mindy Gruzin was selected as the most outstanding.

Mindy is a full time student at Penn State York with a GPA of 3.98, major in Psychology, minor in Biology with Pre-Med focus. She will graduate with her BS in 2020 and then attend medical school to become a physician with a focus on public health research.

She works part time at Wellspan York Hospital and is a single mother of an eleven year old son. Her volunteer activities include science mentor, Diabetes Coalition, STEAM program, and Boy Scouts of America. Prestigious awards, prior and current grants, and research projects in molecular genetics are part of her impressive activities.

Having grown up in foster care from ages 7-18, and now learning about her many accomplishments, helps to explain the opening sentence of her expressive essay: "My life can best be characterized by extreme hardship met with extreme resilience."

Her letter of recommendation from a physics professor contained many superior and glowing statements, including these: "Mindy was reliable, dedicated and eternally upbeat." "Ms. Gruzin is one of the hardest working students that I have worked with in my 2+ decades of college activity, and a key team player."

It will be a pleasure for all to meet Mindy at our May 14 Banquet.

AAUW FUND REPORT

Esther Ngumbi: Entomologist Extraordinaire (AAUW International Fellow)

For Esther Ngumbi, Ph.D., studying insects was never merely an academic interest. As someone who grew up in a farming community on the coast of Kenya, she knew firsthand that these tiny creatures could wipe out entire crops of corn. And that could spell the difference between poverty and economic security for people in rural areas like the one where she grew up, a place where access to insecticides and agricultural education was limited.

With support from her 2007-08 AAUW International Fellowship, Ngumbi earned a Ph.D. in entomology (the study of insects), becoming the first person to earn a doctorate in a community where women's education is not typically a priority. Today, as a post-doctoral researcher at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, she studies sustainable crop growth and environmentally friendly insecticides. She holds three U.S. patents and recently won the 2018 Society of Experimental Biology Presidents Medal.

Ngumbi has also gone above and beyond when it comes to giving back. She mentors young leaders and women scientists through the Clinton Global Initiative University, and she cofounded a school in her hometown that serves more than 100 elementary and middle-school students.

"AAUW paved a way for me, which is why I can now pave a way for others," she says. "For me, it's so other women of color can say 'Hey, she made it despite all of the challenges."
