## **AAUW FUND**

Founded in 1981, the AAUW Legal Advocacy Fund (LAF) works to challenge sex discrimination in workplaces and higher education. The AAUW resources range from community outreach programs to the backing of major cases. Since 1981, LAF has provided millions of dollars to balance the scales of justice for people working toward gender equality through the legal system. In August, a judge in the U.S. District Court in Minnesota ruled that St. Cloud State University must maintain the women's tennis and skiing teams to create equity with the men's teams, and take other steps to provide female students with equitable athletic opportunities. AAUW was proud to support the students in their lawsuit.

To help raise funds for LAF, the York Branch will be selling the Boscov's Friends Helping Friends discount shopping passes that can be used on Wednesday, October 16. All \$5.00 of the purchase price will support LAF. The passes may be purchased at the September and October York Branch meetings. Donations also will be accepted at these meetings. ## **Report on AAUW-PA Retreat – July 27, 2019 (by Betty Hooker)**

### **National**

Kim Churches became C.E.O. of AAUW in 2017 and under her leadership efforts have been made to put AAUW on a sustainable path financially.

1. The national organization was tapping into savings to maintain a large staff. Staff reductions have been made in order to assure that AAUW will be here in the future.
2. The 2017 biennial convention attracted fewer than 1,000 members and cost AAUW (I think) a million dollars to put on. Registration fees fell well-short of costs. Only about 1% of the membership attended, and it is impossible to justify the cost. Smaller gatherings will be held in future years, and electronic gatherings will replace national conventions.
3. The numerous AAUW funds have been aligned to AAUW's mission:
  - A. AAUW's Greatest Needs Fund – Allows AAUW to respond quickly as events dictate. Example is the “Me Too” Movement.
  - B. Education and Training – Examples: Fellowship Alumnae Initiatives, Fellowships and Grants, Public Policy, Research
  - C. Economic Security Fund – Examples: Start Smart, Work Smart, Work Smart Online, Legal Advocacy Fund
  - D. Leadership Fund – Examples: Campus Action Projects, Empower and NCCWSL
4. According to Ann Pehle, some of the funds' endowments are so large that they can go on forever, but they are restricted, so cannot be used to make sure that AAUW remains relevant in a changing society – or even remains!
