### **IN MEMORY – RUTHE CRALEY**

Ruthe Craley passed away on March 20 in Simpsonville, South Carolina, where she was living with her daughter, Stacy Craley. She was 92 years old.

Ruthe joined York Branch in 1983. She served as Public Policy Chair, but she may best be remembered for the key role she played in distributing the *Branch Banter*. Before the days of email and attachments, all members of the Branch received a paper copy of the *Banter* each month except during the summer. Distribution was no small task. It involved collating, stapling, folding, and taping, and then taking the *Banters* to the Post Office for bulk mailing. Ruthe graciously hosted the mailing committee at her home for many years.

Ruthe moved to Gettysburg in 2001 but maintained her membership in York Branch. While in Gettysburg, she was active in the Gettysburg Branch, serving as an officer and on many committees. When Ruthe returned from Gettysburg in 2014, she resumed active participation in York Branch, serving on the Education Committee and the Spring Market Faire Committee. In fact, she was a hostess at her former home on McKenzie Street when the new owners opened their home for the 2015 Spring Market Faire.

Ruthe was a graduate and life-long supporter of Gettysburg College where both of her parents had been professors, and she had a keen interest in politics and women's rights. She served as campaign chair for several candidates, making them promise they would run again if they did not win the first time.

On a personal note, I used to meet Ruthe at the Weis Market parking lot on Carlisle Road and drive her to various meetings. I never knew what topics we would cover in the car, but I always knew the conversation would be stimulating and that I would learn something!

#### **PUBLIC POLICY**

AAUW-PA, in partnership with Fair Districts, is working to improve the operation and transparency of government, especially in relation to redistricting. The transparency bills, House Bill 22 and Senate Bill 222, also called the Legislative and Congressional Redistricting Act (LACRA), are now officially introduced with co-sponsors from both parties. Fair Districts has launched a *March Toward Transparency*, a campaign to talk with every PA state legislator about the need to pass LACRA. ## VOTING ON CHANGE TO AAUW MEMBERSHIP REQUIREMENT

AAUW members will vote on a long-standing membership requirement, which creates a barrier to women who do not hold a college degree. By eliminating this requirement, AAUW can become a more diverse and inclusive organization, better aligned with the needs of women today.

Proposals to eliminate the degree requirement for membership have come before the membership for a vote several times. The AAUW-PA Board feels very strongly that while the degree requirement made perfect sense at AAUW's inception, this requirement is now counter to our mission, and limits our ability to build the skills needed to increase our impact as an organization.

AAUW's mission is to advance gender equity, yet the requirement for membership explicitly denies access to membership to those without college degrees. AAUW cannot promote equity for all women and girls if the organization maintains exclusionary membership requirements. We have had situations such as on the Kitchen Tour, where two friends wanted to join, but only one had a degree. – so, we lost two members! ### New Bylaws Wording - "An individual who supports the AAUW mission and pays annual AAUW dues shall be eligible to be an individual mem ber with all rights and responsibilities of AAUW membership."

AAUW members can now vote on proposed changes to the bylaws recommended by the AAUW Board of Directors and AAUW Governance Committee that would eliminate the degree requirement for membership. You received an email on April 7 with your voting credentials and instructions for voting on AAUW Board members, this Bylaws change and Public Policy changes. Voting closes on Monday, May 17 at 5:00 pm ET.

## **PRIMARY ELECTION – MAY 18, 2021**

Pennsylvania's primary election will be held on Tuesday, May 18. This year's election is open to all voters because there are four constitutional amendments on the ballot.

- An amendment asks voters to allow municipal fire departments or companies with paid personnel and emergency services to become eligible to apply for loans from an existing state loan program.
- An amendment allows the Legislature to terminate or extend disaster emergency declarations or part of them without a governor's approval.
- An amendment limits the governor's emergency declarations to 21 days unless extended by the Legislature. It prevents the governor from issuing new declarations on the same issue unless approved by the Legislature.
- An amendment guarantees that a person's lawful rights will not be infringed in Pennsylvania based on race or ethnicity.
