PUBLIC POLICY

In spite of all the evidence pointing to the need for an increase in the PA minimum wage to a livable wage, no action has been taken by the legislature in Harrisburg. Groups that have taken the lead, like We the People and Raise the Wage PA, are focusing on the three bills that may have some chance of being heard in upcoming sessions: (1) SB672 – Increasing the Minimum Wage, sponsored by Sen. Dan Laughlin (R-Erie County) and Sen. Pat Browne (R-Lehigh County), proposes a one-time increase to \$10. Further increases would be dependent on inflation. Tipped wage would be 40% of the minimum wage; (2) SB12 – Comprehensive Modernization of the Minimum Wage, sponsored by Sen. Christine Tartaglione (D-Phil), proposes an immediate increase to \$12 with yearly increases reaching \$15 by 2027. Tipped wage would be eliminated; (3) HB345 – One Fair Wage is the House companion bill to SB12. The main sponsors are Rep. Patty Kim (D-Dauphin County) and Rep. Stephen Kinsey (D-Phil). At this time, the bill having the best chance of being brought up for consideration is SB672.
