PUBLIC POLICY

AAUW PA passed a resolution in support of Pennsylvania's school funding lawsuit and sent copies to Governor Wolf, PA Secretary of Education Noe Ortega, Senate Majority Leader Jake Corman, House Majority Leader Brian Cutler and John Fetterman, President Pennsylvania Senate. As a courtesy, the email was also copied to Joanna McClinton, Floor Leader of the Pennsylvania Senate, and Jay Costa, Minority Leader Pennsylvania House of Representatives. The trial began Friday, November 12, in Harrisburg. Below are three organizations AAUW PA relies on for strategic guidance, information, and tactics regarding issues in Pennsylvania public schools. You can find up to date information on what is happening with school funding and the lawsuit at any of these websites. AAUW PA has worked with Susan Spicka of Education Voters PA for many years and she was a recipient of the Gateway to Equity Award. We are also an endorsing organization for PA Schools Work.
