FROM THE PODIUM



EDUCATION ISSUES ACTION GROUP

Education has always been a linchpin of AAUW's mission since its inception. Maintaining a high quality of public education is a key element in breaking the cycle of poverty, promoting upward movement, and keeping American-style democracy healthy by exposing students to those who are different from themselves.

With that in mind, our objective is to consider various issues confronting our system of public education, and choose one or two areas where we can be effective as a group, with specific actions and a timeline.

The primary school board elections are past, and the races probably will heat up again in September, but keep them in mind as you encounter any of the local candidates at various events. Be sure to ask them how they feel about book banning, etc., if you get the opportunity.

The same applies to our state legislators. If you have not done so, please write or email yours, urging them to find fair and equitable state funding for the public schools, reminding them that public schools are often, especially in smaller communities, the one place where one meets a cross section of the community. (If you need suggestions or 'talking points' on what to put in the letters, please contact either of us.)

FUNDRAISING COMMITTEE – Fundraiser Facts

We will not be holding a Spring Market Faire fundraising event in 2024 because:

- We lack the "womanpower" to staff it
- Homeowners are reluctant to volunteer their houses post-COVID
- It is difficult to recruit chefs

The decision to search for a substitute for the Spring Market Faire was made after a great deal of careful thought and consideration.

The Fundraising Committee has decided, with the approval of the Board, to host a Spring Luncheon fundraiser to be held at the Country Club of York, Sunday, April 28, 2024. The event will feature entertainment, a basket raffle, an enticing catered meal, and a pleasant afternoon in a lovely venue. We anticipate reaching out to the community, resulting in approximately 100 guests. The event then has a dual purpose – to raise funds for our scholarship program and to increase community awareness of our Branch and our purpose.

Analyzing all the costs, we can make a profit charging \$50 - \$60 per ticket. We also will encourage contributions in the form of sponsorships and/or the purchase of advertising in a booklet that will be distributed at the event.

The Spring Luncheon format will be less labor intensive, enabling our Branch members to relax and enjoy the day. The Fundraising Committee will be coming together again in the fall to flesh out our plans. We welcome all our members to help us by sharing your thoughts and experiences. If you have attended a meeting or event at which there was a performer, speaker, musician, etc., that you feel we might consider, send me an email or give me a call. If you know of a local merchant or businessperson who might serve as a sponsor, let me know. If you want to be a part of the planning, I can add you to our email list. Together, we can make this a productive, enjoyable means of financing our Branch and its scholarship programs.
