DIVERSITY, EQUITY, & INCLUSION COMMITTEE

Since DEI is a current news topic, it is a good time to review what is meant by DEI. Our AAUW York Branch, with the encouragement of AAUW National and AAUW PA, determined that Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion are important issues that our Branch should address. A DEI Committee was established to provide resources that can be a guide to help answer questions about DEI issues. Below are definitions for you to consider:

Diversity – In essence, diversity means variety, especially the inclusion of different types of people (such as people of different races or cultures) in a group or organization. It also means that recognizing what makes us different is important. If we do not take diversity into consideration, we run the risk of excluding some individuals.

Equity – Freedom from bias or favoritism. Equity is about everyone having equal access to what they need to be successful. As AAUW members, we fight for gender equity to narrow the pay gap for women, champion equal opportunity for women in education, and work together to support laws and policies that enable women's success.

Inclusion – The act or practice of including and accommodating people who historically have been excluded (such as because of their race, gender, sexuality or ability). *Diversity* is being invited to the party and *inclusion* is being asked to dance. Inclusion entails behaviors and actions that make us feel welcomed or not. An example of how we can support inclusion is by properly using an individual's correct pronoun. It is an easy way to show respect.
