# **DIVERSITY, EQUITY, & INCLUSION COMMITTEE**

In early April, the federal administration required schools to abolish their equity programs or risk losing federal funding. A superintendent of schools responded in a letter to the administration to explain the negative impact such a policy would have on students.

The educator stated that the student who would be most affected would be 'low-income students, disabled students, and English learners.' The superintendent relayed that 'equity is not a threat. It's the antidote to decades of failure. Equity is what ensures all students have a fair shot. Equity is what makes the nonverbal kindergartner use an AAC (assistive) device. It's what gets the newcomer from the Ukraine the ESL support she needs without being left behind.'

Just imagine not being allowed to use your glasses while taking a written driver's test. No matter how hard you try, it is not possible to read the test. Now imagine a struggling student without any academic support while trying to learn. Another reason for us, AAUW, to support Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion.

# PUBLIC POLICY

As Congress continues to drive forward sweeping cuts to student financial assistance in the federal budget, our voices are critical to support the millions of students whose futures are in jeopardy. The House Education & Workforce Committee's budget reconciliation bill would make harmful changes to Pell Grant eligibility – penalizing those who can least afford it. The proposal raises the threshold for 'full-time' status to 15 credits per term and eliminates Pell Grants entirely for students enrolled less than half-time. These changes would hit student parents hardest. Nearly 60% of student parents already work full time while pursuing their degrees, and childcare costs push their total expenses up to five times higher than their peers without children. Black and Latina mothers – who make up a significant share of Pell recipients – would face impossible choices. To keep their aid, they would need to add classes to already overloaded schedules or risk losing a quarter or more of their grants. For many, that means borrowing more or abandoning their education altogether. Write to your representative and tell Congress to support students in completing their degrees, not rip away that potential.
