DIVERSITY, EQUITY, & INCLUSION COMMITTEE

As we reflect upon the impact of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion on women's lives, it is important to see how it has improved women's opportunities and quality of life. The League of Women Voters has highlighted some of those opportunities:

"Opening admission and increasing opportunities at universities and corporations nationwide; Creating mentorship opportunities, leadership trainings, scholarships, investment programs, and more that grow women's success;

Encouraging everyone from medical researchers to film producers to pay attention to women's needs and perspectives;

Creating safer workplaces through anti-harassment programs and anti-discrimination policies; Promoting pregnancy and parental leave and benefits:

In some cases, imposing quotas so schools and workplaces entrenched in patriarchy were forced to open their doors to qualified women.

In 1997, it was estimated that at least 6 million women held positions they wouldn't otherwise hold because of affirmative action. Notably, while opponents to DEI claim that Black women and other women of color benefit the most from DEI, most of the women who obtained these positions were white."

Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion policies affect all women. That is why AAUW will continue to consider it an essential part of its advocacy efforts.

HIGHER EDUCATION SCHOLARSHIP COMMITTEE

The past fiscal year has been a year of transition for the HESC. Recently and for a few years, we had been awarding scholarships to high school students to participate in the Dual Enrollment Programs at the three local colleges: Harrisburg Area Community College, Penn State University/York Campus, and York College of Pennsylvania. Nancy Spataro, who was the Chairperson of the committee at that time, recommended our Branch's discontinuation of it. Instead, she suggested we consider giving scholarships to high school seniors who would be entering college the following September. Last year, we awarded an Undergraduate Scholarship and a Graduate Scholarship. These applications were unsolicited and entered online. They both qualified for the scholarships awarded them.

Two of our committee members met with the chairperson of the Garden Club of York's scholarship committee to discuss their process for awarding high school seniors scholarships. As this meeting took place in January 2025, we knew it was too late in the year to begin such a process. Therefore, our committee eventually decided to offer undergraduate and graduate scholarships as in the past when there was a scholarship committee for each category.

At our January 16 meeting, Carol Eicher was invited to meet with us to discuss her interest in sponsoring a scholarship(s) in memory of her mother, Doris Cohen. Doris had been a long-time member of the York Branch of AAUW. Remembered for her intellect, artistry and curiosity, she enjoyed the arts and travel. She was a role model in her fields of education and business. Carol donated \$5,000 for this year's scholarship winners.

With the donation, we decided to offer two Doris Cohen Memorial Undergraduate Scholarships for \$2,500 each. Additionally, the York Branch sponsored a \$3,000 graduate scholarship. We had 13 applicants for the spring: 4 for a graduate scholarship and 9 for undergraduate scholarships. The Graduate Scholarship winner is Kali Barnes, who is studying Public Policy and Administration at York College. The undergraduate scholarships were awarded to two students from Penn State York: Catherine Kurnik, who is majoring in English and History, and Francesca Rodman, who is majoring in Human Development and Family Studies/Psychology.

Additionally, we sponsored two Penn State York students to the annual NCCWSL conference at the University of Maryland at the end of May. They are Alyssa Bortner and Tirzah Miller.

In May, a highlight of the end of year meeting, especially for our committee members, was to finally meet our scholarship winners for the fall semester 2024. Sully Pinos, the Graduate Scholarship winner, and Kori Thompson, our Undergraduate Scholarship winner, spoke about their academic year and the impact it has had on them. They were appreciative and dynamic in describing their studies and their hopes in integrating their newly acquired knowledge in helping others in their careers, present or future.
